City Voices, City Visions Institute Evaluation: Spring 2006

Twelve Dunkirk Middle School teachers involved in a City Voices, City Visions professional development program in the Spring 2006 provided comments on their experience:

Teachers also provided values for seven statements, which are summarized below.

Teachers positive evaluations and comments also allowed teachers to consider what else they still wanted to learn and several stated that they would like a continuation of the professional development at the start of the following year. Teachers stated that they still wanted to learn how to save and store completed videos to CD-ROM or DVD, use more advanced editing techniques, and incorporate more genre types.

Teachers were presented a number of genres for digital video projects. Teachers stated they plan to use iMovie in a day, video quilts, movie trailers, iPoems, iSpeaks, commercials, PSA, newscasts, and interviews with their students within the following year.
